# BUSINESS & SOCIETY

## *B.A. Degree*

The bachelor's degree in business and society is designed primarily to prepare students for the study and practice of law, with a particular emphasis and business and economic issues related to law. It would also provide useful preparation for careers in or the advanced study of areas including public policy and urban and regional planning.

**CAREER OPPORTUNITIES AND RELATED OCCUPATIONS:** Opportunities are significant for persons working as lawyers and urban and regional planners. There may be fewer opportunities for persons working as public policy analysts.

**EDUCATIONAL QUALIFICATIONS:** In most jurisdictions, practice as a lawyer requires the possession of a law degree (in the United States, the Juris Doctor). Work in public policy and urban and regional planning typically requires a master's degree in the relevant area.

**JOB OUTLOOK:** Employment of lawyers is expected to grow about as fast as average for all occupations through 2014, primarily as a result of growth in the population and in the general level of business activities. Job growth among lawyers also will result from increasing demand for legal services in such areas as health care, intellectual property, venture capital, energy, elder antitrust, and environmental law.

**SALARY:** In 2008, the median annual earnings of all lawyers were **\$102,470**. The middle half of the occupation earned between **\$69,910** and **\$145,600**. Median annual earnings in the industries employing the largest numbers of lawyers in May 2008 were as follows:

Management of companies and enterprises.....	\$128,610
Federal Government.....	\$119,240
Legal Services.....	\$108,100
Local Government.....	\$78,810
State Government.....	\$75,840
